Leaders of the future

The 2007 Australian Fulbright Scholars are the nation's "ambassadors to the world, representing a modern and intellectually outward-looking Australia", according to the Minister for Education, Science and Training, Julie Bishop.

In congratulating the twenty-two Australian Scholars at the recent Fulbright Presentation Dinner in Brisbane, Minister Bishop said the experiences gained through a Fulbright Scholarship broaden the horizons and shape the views of these Scholars who will be leaders of the future.

"This group represents some of the best and brightest people from across Australia in the fields of law, the arts and the sciences. These are the high-achievers who inspire others. They join a group which is internationally recognised for their academic achievement.'

"These Scholars will, over the next year, work with the leaders in their fields in the United States and develop the personal linkages and professional networks that will help them follow in the footsteps of Fulbright Alumni."

"Their scholarships will be a crucial step in them becoming an influential part of Australia's future," she said.

Minister Bishop spoke about the value of an international exchange experience and drew from her own experience when she spent time at Harvard Business School.

"Our universities, our teachers and our researchers gain from international engagement, just as alumni networks can build important commercial, diplomatic and personal links."

"Links between nations, mutual understanding between cultures, and the exchange of ideas between people are not just forged through treaties. The links that are forged through programs such as Fulbright have an abiding role," said Minister Bishop.

Minister Bishop was joined in congratulating the Scholars by Dan Clune (Deputy Chief of Mission, U.S. Embassy), Greg Hunt (then National President of the Australian Fulbright Association and the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Foreign Affairs), and Peter Coaldrake (Chair, Australian-American Fulbright Commission).

The Queensland Minister for State Development, Employment and Industrial Relations, John Mickel, used the occasion to announce the establishment of the Fulbright Queensland Scholarship in 2008.

Minister Mickel announced that the Queensland Government would match the Queensland universities' one-off contribution of \$250,000 to set up the perpetual scholarship.

The 2007 Presentation Dinner was hosted by The University of Queensland, with musical performances provided by Griffith University's Conservatorium of Music. The performances included Well Strung Strings Quartet, a Trumpet Fanfare by Joel Hardy and the Jazz Australis Trio with William Barton on didgeridoo.

The Presentation Dinner concluded with Peter Coaldrake announcing the 2008 Presentation Dinner will be hosted by The University of Western Australia on 13 March 2008.

in generating the contributions from the Queensland based universities and Queensland Government in establishing the Fulbright Queensland Scholarship.

We are looking to explore the development of similar scholarships in other states and will be talking with Alumni Chapters and potential supporters over the next six months.

In promoting the 2008 Fulbright Scholarships the Commission is seeking to reach out to more regionally based and smaller universities to make their faculty and students aware of the opportunity. In 2006 both Swinburne and Southern Cross universities recognised their first ever Fulbright Scholars. We hope to see more Australian universities recognise this 'first' in 2008.

I look forward to meeting with many of our American Alumni at the Seminars in October at UC San Diego (12-14 Oct.) and Northwestern University (19 – 21 Oct.), along with the New York City reception (25 Oct.).

A unique memento

At the Fulbright Presentation Dinner Professor Peter Coaldrake, Chair of the Fulbright Commission Board, thanked Emeritus Professor Roy Webb AO, former Vice-Chancellor of Griffith University and also Chair of the Fulbright Commission (1986-1990).

Professor Webb had presented to the Fulbright Commission a copy of the May 1987 issue of The Annals of the American Academy of Political and Social Science, which was dedicated to the Fulbright Experience and Academic Exchanges in recognition and celebration of the 40th Anniversary of the Fulbright Program. The copy was autographed by Senator Fulbright for Professor Webb during the celebratory events in Washington DC in 1987.

"Since a very modest beginning 40 years ago, some 156,000 men and women have

participated in the international educational exchange program outlined in the Fulbright Act of 1946. Many of these men and women now occupy positions of importance and influence in their respective societies.

These people have acquired a capacity for empathy: they bring to their communities an understanding of other countries, their customs, religions, and history and are thereby capable of sound judgment in making decisions affecting the relationship of their respective countries with other countries with different traditions and cultures. In this era of strife and violence, people who are capable of understanding and of mitigating the passions that arise from the conflict of ideological convictions are essential if the community of nations is to find a way to adjust to the reality of the age of nuclear weapons."

2008 Fulbright Symposium

Applications now open for the 2008 Fulbright Symposium

The Australian-American Fulbright Commission annually offers a grant of \$A30,000 to a university, group, or individual to host the Fulbright Symposium. The Symposium focuses on a topic of current bi-national interest between Australia and the United States and engages leading speakers from both countries.

Applications close Friday 27 July 2007.



Fulbright State Scholarships

Scholars in Queensland and Western Australia working on a topic or issue relevant to their State will now be able to apply for specific Fulbright State Scholarships.

Following in the footsteps of Tasmania, which established the first state-sponsored Fulbright Scholarship in 2006, the Queensland and Western Australian Scholarships will be for Scholars to undertake study or research in the U.S. on projects beneficial to their state.

The Queensland Scholarship, open to postgraduates, was announced by the Queensland Minister for State Development, John Mickel, at the 2007 Fulbright Presentation Dinner.

Minister Mickel announced that the State Government would match the Queensland universities' one-off contribution of \$250,000 to set up the perpetual scholarship. He stated: "Queenslanders do typically perform well in the highly competitive national selection process for these prestigious scholarships but, as of 2008, Queensland candidates will have even greater opportunity".

Minister Mickel said the newly established scholarship would provide opportunities for successive generations of talented researchers as part of the Government's Smart State commitment.

The Western Australian Scholarship Fund was launched at a reception in April hosted by the University of Western Australia and the U.S. Consul General in Perth, Robin McClellan. The launch kicked off the campaign to raise \$A1 million to establish the Fulbright WA Scholarship Fund.

This joint endeavour between the U.S. Consulate in Perth, the WA Fulbright Alumni Chapter, and WA based universities and companies aims to annually support in perpetuity two Fulbright WA Scholarships.

The inaugural Tasmanian Fulbright Scholar, Ben Mooney, was honoured at a dinner hosted by the University of Tasmania in March and attended by U.S. Ambassador Robert McCallum on his first visit to Tasmania.

Ben is undertaking a PhD in Plant Science at the University of Tasmania. His Fulbright research at the University of Maryland Biotechnology Institute and the State University of New York, Syracuse, aims to shed scientific light on marine algae that cause multi-million dollar fish-kills in aquaculture operations around the world.

Auto vehicle formation control

Through the generous donations of the U.S. Alumni Scholarship Fund, Tyler Summers has won the 2007 Fulbright U.S. Alumni Scholarship to undertake research into the control of autonomous vehicle formations at the Australian National University (ANU). The prestigious U.S. Alumni Scholarship is awarded to the highest ranked U.S. Postgraduate Scholar.

Tyler is a mechanical engineering graduate from the Texas Christian University and aerospace engineering graduate from The University of Texas at Austin. Tyler's Fulbright research, entitled Control of Autonomous Vehicle Formations, will be the foundation for his doctoral dissertation.

An autonomous vehicle formation can be thought of as a team of vehicles working together to accomplish a task without human intervention. "Control of these

vehicles is an exciting and innovative new research area that lies at the intersection of the rapidly advancing fields of communications, sensing and control theory," said Tyler.

"Examples of these formations could include groups of cars automatically navigating through city traffic, or a swarm of unmanned aircraft performing a military reconnaissance and surveillance mission in an unknown hostile environment. I propose to develop a new theory for control of autonomous vehicle

On Tyler's return to the U.S. he plans to finish his PhD in Aerospace Engineering and to pursue a research career developing control theory for innovative applications and to teach at a university. "I hope to someday pass along this passion and excitement to the next generation of engineers and galvanise them into utilising their own creativity and innovation in the engineering field."

Alumni fund puts leukaemia in the spotlight

Dr Steven Lane has won the 2007 Fulbright Postgraduate Australian Alumni (WG Walker) Scholarship to conduct research into acute myeloid leukemia (AML) at the Harvard Medical School and Dana-Farber Cancer Institute in Boston.

Dr Lane describes AML as an aggressive and rapidly fatal cancer of the bone marrow and blood.

"Despite intensive chemotherapy, most adults with AML eventually succumb to the disease. New and more effective treatments are urgently needed to improve patient survival," said Steven.

The prestigious Australian Alumni (WG Walker) Scholarship goes to the highest ranked postgraduate and is funded through an endowment fund supported by donations from Australian Fulbright Alumni and Friends of the Fulbright Program.

Steven is currently an Advanced Training Haematology Registrar at the Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital in Queensland. He completed a Bachelor of Medicine and Surgery with honours at The University of Queensland (1999).

Steven will conduct research into AML which may be used in conjunction with current clinical trials to discover a relevant biomarker for disease response, or possibly to develop more effective and potent drugs to treat AML.

As the recipient of the Alumni (WG Walker) Scholarship, Steven said he will have access to world leading centres of learning and research excellence.

"My goal is to develop ongoing, long-term collaboration between laboratories and hospitals, allowing Australian sites to participate in multi-centre investigational trials based either in the U.S. or Australia. This would facilitate access to developing pharmaceuticals and technologies not currently available in Australia," said Steven.
